Alexey Gromyko, Director of the Institute of Europe of the Russian Academy of Sciences; lectures at the Moscow State Institute of International Relations (MGIMO) of the Russian Ministry of Foreign Affairs; co-founder of the Russian movement Support For a Democratic Global Order and for the United Nations; author of over 50 academic papers.



Chandran Nair, Founder and CEO of the Global Institute for Tomorrow (GIFT), an independent pan-Asian think tank based in Hong Kong and Kuala Lumpur; previously Chairman of ERM (leading environmental consultancy) in Asia Pacificy; Executive Committee member of the Club of Rome: author of Dismantling Global White Privilege (2022).
